### COUNTY COUNSEL'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE M

Reg. of Voters
ANALYSIS BY THE COUNTY COUNSEL FOR THE COUNTY OF ALAMEDA OF A
FREMONT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT BOND MEASURE

Measure M ("Measure"), a Fremont Unified School District ("District") bond measure, seeks voter approval to authorize the District to issue and sell bonds of up to \$919,000,000 in aggregate principal amount at interest rates that will not exceed the maximum rate allowed by Education Code Sections 15140 to 15143. as modified by Government Code Section 53531.

Pursuant to provisions of the California Constitution and the California Education Code, if 55% of those who vote on the Measure vote "yes," the District will be authorized to issue bonds in the amount noted above. Approval of this Measure will authorize a levy on the assessed value of taxable property within the District by an amount needed to pay the principal and interest on these bonds in each year that the bonds are outstanding.

If approved, the District's best estimate of the tax rates required to be levied to fund the bond issue is as follows: the average annual tax rate estimate and the highest tax rate estimate are \$49 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation. The final fiscal year anticipated to collect the tax is 2056/57, and the total debt service estimate to repay all of the bonds (including principal and interest) is approximately \$2 billion.

California Education Code Section 15100 restricts the use of the proceeds from the bond sale to items such as building school buildings, improving school grounds, and supplying school buildings and grounds with equipment. In addition, proceeds may only be used for the projects listed in the Measure and not for any other purpose, such as teacher and administrator salaries.

This Measure provides that its proceeds will fund projects set forth in the full text of the Measure printed in this sample ballot that include, among others: repairing and upgrading local schools by updating classrooms, science labs, and classroom technology and equipment; replacing leaking roofs; replacing outdated, aging and deteriorating portables with permanent classrooms; acquiring, constructing, and repairing classrooms, facilities, sites, and equipment; and replacing inefficient HVAC, electrical, and plumbing systems with updated sustainable systems.

Certain accountability measures apply, such as establishing an account to deposit the proceeds from the sale of the bonds. To ensure that the proceeds are spent only for the projects listed in the Measure, it provides for an independent citizens' oversight committee, an annual independent performance audit, and an annual financial audit. Finally, the Superintendent shall file a report no later than January 1 of each year after the sale of the first series of bonds, stating the amount of the bond proceeds received and expended and the status of any project funded from the proceeds.


This Measure is placed on the ballot by the governing board of the District.



#### RESOLUTION NO. 011-2425

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE FREMONT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ORDERING AN ELECTION, AND ESTABLISHING SPECIFICATIONS OF THE ELECTION ORDER

- WHEREAS, the Board of Education (the "Board") of the Fremont Unified School District (the "District") is devoted to improving the quality of education in our local public schools by providing updated equipment for classrooms, science labs and libraries; and
- WHEREAS, the Board has determined that schools within the District need updated classrooms, science labs and classroom technology each provided in a fiscally prudent manner to enable District students to have access to the same state-of-the-art educational facilities that other students in Alameda County already have; and
- WHEREAS, because of the age of Fremont schools, basic repairs are also needed, such as replacing aging and leaky roofs, aging technology infrastructure, and outdated and inefficient heating, cooling, electrical and plumbing systems; and
- WHEREAS, the District has developed a long-term capital facilities plan and conducted multiple community meetings receiving input on needed facility improvements; and
- WHEREAS, since the State of California (the "State") does not provide the District with enough funding for facilities, local Fremont schools cannot maintain quality educational programs without local funding provided by a locally supported measure: and
- WHEREAS, whether or not you have school-age children, supporting quality education is a wise investment, as good schools protect our quality of life and our property values:
- WHEREAS, the Board has received information regarding the possibility of a local bond measure and the District's bonding capacity; and
- WHEREAS, the Board determines that every penny from a local measure must benefit only Fremont elementary, middle and high schools, and that funds generated by such a measure cannot be taken away by the State; and
- WHEREAS, the measure will include mandatory taxpayer protections, including independent citizens oversight, annual audits and reports to the community to ensure the District used the funds as promised; and
- WHEREAS, by law, no money from this measure can be used for administrator salaries or central administration; and
- WHEREAS, over the years the District has been fiscally prudent and a good steward of taxpayer dollars securing over \$51 million in property owner savings through several bond refinancings and by maintaining a strong credit rating; and
  - WHEREAS, these savings have lowered property tax bills for District residents: and

- WHEREAS, on November 7, 2000, the voters of California approved the Smaller Classes, Safer Schools and Financial Accountability Act ("Proposition 39") which reduced the voter threshold for *ad valorem* property tax levies used to pay for debt service on bonded indebtedness to 55% of the votes cast on a school district general obligation bond measure; and
- WHEREAS, concurrent with the passage of Proposition 39. Chapter 1.5, Part 10, Division 1. Title 1 (commencing with Section 15264) of the Education Code (the "Act") became operative and established requirements associated with the implementation of Proposition 39; and
- WHEREAS, the Board desires to make certain findings herein to be applicable to this election order and to establish certain performance audits, standards of financial accountability and citizen oversight that are contained in Proposition 39 and the Act; and
- WHEREAS, the Board and District have solicited stakeholder and community input on school priorities from parents, teachers, staff, the community and civic leaders; and
- WHEREAS, the Board desires to authorize the submission of a proposition to the District's voters at an election to authorize the issuance of bonds to pay for certain necessary improvements and enhancements to District educational facilities which will improve the safety, health, and quality of education for students in the District; and
- WHEREAS, the Board hereby determines that, in accordance with Opinion No. 04-110 of the Attorney General of the State of California, the restrictions in Proposition 39 which prohibit any bond money from being wasted or used for inappropriate administrative salaries or other operating expenses of the District shall be strictly monitored by the District's Citizens' Oversight Committee; and
- WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code Section 15270, based upon a projection of assessed property valuation, the Board has determined that, if approved by voters, the tax rate levied to meet the debt service requirements of the bonds proposed to be issued for school facilities will not exceed the Proposition 39 limits per year per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of taxable property; and
- WHEREAS, Elections Code Section 9400 *et seq.* requires that a tax rate statement be contained in all official materials relating to the election, including any ballot pamphlet prepared, sponsored, or distributed by the District; and
- WHEREAS, the Board desires to authorize the filing of a tax rate statement and a ballot argument in favor of the proposition to be submitted to the voters at the election; and
- WHEREAS, pursuant to the Elections Code, it is appropriate for the Board to request consolidation of the election with any and all other elections to be held on Tuesday, November 5, 2024, and to request the Alameda County Registrar of Voters to perform certain election services for the District.
- NOW THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE FREMONT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:
- Section 1. That the Board, pursuant to Education Code Sections 15100 *et seq.*, 15264 *et seq.*, and Government Code Section 53506, hereby requests the Alameda County Registrar of Voter to conduct an election under the provisions of Proposition 39 and the Act and submit to the electors

of the District the question of whether bonds of the District in the aggregate principal amount of \$919,000,000 (the "Bonds") shall be issued and sold for the purpose of raising money for the projects described in Exhibits "A" and "B" hereto. Both exhibits are directed to be printed in the voter pamphlet. The District's Superintendent, or designee, is hereby authorized and directed to make any changes to the text of the measure, or to the abbreviated form of the measure, as may be convenient or necessary to comply with the intent of this Resolution, the requirements of election officials, and requirements of law.

### Section 2. That the date of the election shall be November 5, 2024.

- Section 3. That the purpose of the election shall be for the voters in the District to vote on a proposition, a copy of which is attached hereto and marked Exhibit "A," incorporated by reference herein, and containing the question of whether the District shall issue the Bonds to pay for improvements to the extent permitted by such proposition. In compliance with Proposition 39 policies of the Board and the Act, the ballot propositions in Exhibits "A" and "B" are subject to the following requirements and determinations:
- (a) that the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds shall be used only for the purposes set forth in the ballot measure and not for any other purpose, including teacher or administrator salaries or other school operating expenses:
- (b) that the Board, in establishing the projects set forth in Exhibit "B," evaluated the safety, class size reduction, classroom, educational and information technology needs of the District;
- (c) that the Board shall cause an annual, independent performance audit to be conducted to ensure that the Bond monies get spent only for the projects identified in Exhibit "B" hereto:
- (d) that the Board shall cause an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of Bonds to be conducted until all of the Bond proceeds have been expended:
- (e) that the Board shall appoint a Citizens' Oversight Committee in compliance with Education Code Section 15278 no later than 60 days after the Board enters the election results in its minutes pursuant to Education Code Section 15274; and
- (f) that the tax levy authorized to secure the Bonds of this election shall not exceed the Proposition 39 limits per \$100,000 of taxable property in the District when assessed valuation is projected by the District to increase in accordance with Article XIIIA of the California Constitution.
- Section 4. That the authority for ordering the election is contained in Education Code Sections 15100 *et seq.*. 15264 *et seq.*. and Government Code Section 53506.
- Section 5. That the authority for the specifications of this election order is contained in Education Code Section 5322. In connection with ordering the election pursuant to the provisions cited above, the District has obtained reasonable and informed projections of assessed property valuations that take into consideration projections of assessed property valuations made by the Alameda County Assessor that are available to the District.
- Section 6. That the Alameda Registrar of Voters and the Alameda County Board of Supervisors are hereby requested to consolidate the election ordered hereby with any and all other

elections to be held on November 5, 2024 within the District. As provided in Elections Code Section 10403, the District acknowledges that the consolidation election will be conducted in the manner described in Elections Code Section 10418.

Section 7. That the Secretary of the Board is hereby directed to deliver a certified copy of this Resolution to the Alameda County Registrar of Voters no later than August 9, 2024.


Section 8. That Bonds may be issued pursuant to Education Code Section 15264 *et seq.* or Government Code Section 53506. The maximum rate of interest on any Bond shall not exceed the maximum rate allowed by Education Code Sections 15140 to 15143, as modified by Government Code Section 53531.

Section 9. That the Board requests the governing body of any such other political subdivision, or any officer otherwise authorized by law, to partially or completely consolidate such election and to further provide that the canvass of the returns of the election be made by any body or official authorized by law to canvass such returns, and that the Board consents to such consolidation. The Board further authorizes the submission of a tax rate statement and primary and rebuttal arguments, as appropriate, to be filed with the Alameda County Registrar of Voters by the established deadlines.

Section 10. Pursuant to Education Code Section 5303 and Elections Code Section 10002, the Board of Supervisors of Alameda County are requested to permit their Registrar of Voters to render all services specified by Elections Code Section 10418 relating to the election, for which services the District agrees to reimburse Alameda County, such services to include the publication of a Formal Notice of School Bond Election and the mailing of the sample ballot and tax rate statement (described in Elections Code Section 9401) pursuant to the terms of Education Code Section 5363 and Elections Code Section 12112.

# FULL TEXT BALLOT PROPOSITION OF THE FREMONT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT BOND MEASURE ELECTION NOVEMBER 5, 2024

The following is the full proposition presented to the voters by the Fremont Unified School District.

"To repair upgrade local schools by updating classrooms' science labs' classroom technology' equipment: replacing leaking roofs: replacing outdated, aging deteriorating portables with permanent classrooms; acquiring, constructing, repairing classrooms, facilities, sites equipment: and replacing inefficient HVAC, electrical plumbing systems with updated sustainable systems: shall Fremont Unified School District's measure authorizing \$919,000,000 in bonds at legal rates, levying 4.9c \$100 assessed value (\$63,000,000 annually) while bonds are outstanding, be adopted, requiring citizen oversight/ audits, and no money for administrators' salaries?"

### PROJECT LIST

The Board of Education of the Fremont Unified School District is committed to supporting the quality of education in local Fremont schools by providing safe, secure and modern classrooms, science labs and classroom technology needed to provide District students access to the same state-of-the-art educational facilities as other students in Alameda County. To that end, the Board evaluated the District's urgent and critical facility needs, including safety issues, class size reduction, basic repairs, and computer and information technology needs in developing the types of projects to be funded by this measure as described below.

In approving this Project List, the Board of Education determines that the District must:

- (i) PROVIDE updated equipment and computers for classrooms, science labs and libraries; and
- (ii) REQUIRE that every penny of this measure benefit Fremont elementary, middle and high schools, and that funds cannot be taken by the State; and
  - (iii) REPLACE aging and leaky roofs; and
- (iv) UPDATE classrooms and classroom technology for current educational standards; and
- (v) REQUIRE THAT MONEY FROM THIS MEASURE CANNOT BE USED FOR ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES OR CENTRAL ADMINISTRATION AND THAT ALL FUNDS ARE SUBJECT TO INDEPENDENT CITIZEN OVERSIGHT, ANNUAL AUDITS AND REPORTS TO THE COMMUNITY TO ENSURE THE DISTRICT USES FUNDS AS PROMISED.

The Project List includes the following types of upgrades and improvements at District schools, facilities and sites:

## LOCAL FUNDING TO UPGRADE AGING SCHOOLS, CLASSROOMS AND SCHOOL FACILITIES TO IMPROVE QUALITY EDUCATION

### School Repair, Safety and Upgrade Projects

### Goals and Purposes:

By law, no money from this measure can be used for administrator salaries or central administration. This measure ensures that large property owner and large businesses pay their fair share so average homeowners do not shoulder the entire burden. Every penny raised by this measure will benefit Fremont elementary, middle and high schools, and cannot be taken away by the State.

- Replace aging and leaky roofs.
- Repair, replace, upgrade and install security, fire, lighting and other safety systems.
- Update classrooms, science labs and technology.
- Replace outdated, aging and deteriorating portable classrooms with permanent classrooms.

- Improve libraries and library technology.

In addition to the projects listed above, the repair and renovation of each of the existing school and District support facilities may include, but not be limited to, some or all of the following: add or renovate student and staff restrooms; repair and upgrade electrical, plumbing, heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems; upgrade of facilities for energy efficiencies, electrical generation and financial savings: improve accessibility for students, staff and the public with disabilities: repair and replace worn-out and deteriorated roofs, windows, walls, floors, doors and drinking fountains hydration stations: construct or renovate offices and facilities for multipurpose and indoor outdoor learning spaces, more efficient areas for professional development and administration and for the safety of students on campuses; install wiring and electrical systems to safely accommodate computers, technology and other electrical devices: upgrade or construct support facilities including administrative, central kitchens, physical education, music, art, and performing and fine arts classrooms or facilities, science, computer labs/classrooms, career technical facilities, media centers/libraries and buildings, covered eating areas, shade and rain shelter, playgrounds, administrative and maintenance facilities and yards; acquire modular portable classrooms; repair and replace fire alarms, emergency communications, public address and security systems; improve facilities to satisfy ADA and seismic requirements: as needed, removal of hazardous materials like asbestos and lead paint from older schools, as needed; improve resurface or replace asphalt, broken concrete and improve hard courts, turf, tracks, athletic fields, irrigation, and downspout drainage systems and campus landscaping; install signage, solar electric systems and fencing; expand parking and improve pick-up and drop-off areas: improve all site utilities: acquire land; construct new school buildings: upgrade or replace interior and exterior painting, floor covering, including carpets, and school facades; demolition; upgrade kitchens, food service and school cafeterias; construct various forms of storage and support spaces and classrooms; improve quads; repair, upgrade and install interior and exterior lighting systems and back-up power generators; improve or replace playgrounds, play structures, athletic fields stadiums, lockers and facilities to support student health, fitness and safety; construct or upgrade aquatic facilities, pools, including pool filtration systems, plaster and decking: replace outdated security fences and security systems (including access control systems). provide lunch shelters, indoor space for assemblies or for rainy day lunch; upgrade music labs, multipurpose rooms, learning centers and media centers; add or upgrade parking lots including solar systems and electric vehicle charging stations. In addition to the listed projects stated above, the Project List also includes the acquisition of a variety of instructional, maintenance and operational equipment, including the reduction or retirement of outstanding lease obligations and interim funding incurred to advance fund projects from the Project List; payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility studies, assessment reviews, facility master plan preparation and updates, environmental studies (including environmental investigation, remediation and monitoring), design

and construction documentation, DSA oversight, and temporary housing of dislocated District activities caused by construction projects.

The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, network rewiring, cabling, computers, portable interface devices, servers, switches, routers, modules, sound projection systems, laser printers, scanners and copiers, digital white boards, document projectors, upgrade voice-over-IP, clock/telephone/ intercom systems, call manager and network security/firewall, wireless technology systems, refresh classroom technology, miscellaneous IT and instructional equipment, data storage, archiving and preservation, phones, identity cards and the construction and installation of a data center in the cloud for the District's enterprise systems, such as resource planning, websites, domain name systems, cloud applications and information security.

The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans and construction documents are finalized, construction bids are received, construction contracts are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Demolition of portable classrooms and existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for repair and upgrade may occur, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating more enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. Necessary site preparation restoration may occur in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable or modular classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing irrigation or drainage systems, utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, or rights of way to the property. The listed projects will be completed as Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, equipment, architectural. engineering, and similar planning costs, connection fees, program and project management, staff training expenses and a customary contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs. Proceeds of the bonds may be used to pay or reimburse the District for the cost of District bond audits and staff when performing work on or necessary and incidental to bond projects. Bond proceeds shall only be expended for the types of projects and purposes identified herein. The District shall create an account into which proceeds of the bonds shall be deposited and comply with the reporting requirements of Government Code § 53410.

#### FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY

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This bond measure has strict accountability requirements including:

- 1. EVERY PENNY OF THIS MEASURE WILL BENEFIT FREMONT ELEMENTARY, MIDDLE AND HIGH SCHOOLS AND CANNOT BE TAKEN BY THE STATE.
- 2. Proceeds from the sale of the bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the acquisition, construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities. BY LAW, NO MONEY FROM THIS MEASURE CAN BE USED FOR ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES OR CENTRAL ADMINISTRATION.

- 3. THE MEASURE REQUIRES INDEPENDENT CITIZEN OVERSIGHT, ANNUAL AUDITS AND REPORTS TO THE COMMUNITY TO ENSURE THAT THE DISTRICT USES THE FUNDS AS PROMISED. The citizens oversight committee must include, among others, representation of a bona fide taxpayers association, a business organization and a senior citizens organization. No District employees or vendors are allowed to serve on the citizens' oversight committee.
- 4. THE MEASURE REQUIRES PUBLIC DISCLOSURE OF ALL SPENDING.

### TAX RATE STATEMENT CONCERNING MEASURE

An election will be held in the Fremont Unified School District (the "District") on November 5, 2024, to authorize the sale of up to \$919,000,000 in general obligation bonds (the "2024 Bond Authorization"). If such bonds are authorized and sold, principal and interest on the bonds will be payable only from the proceeds of *ad valorem* tax levies made upon the taxable property in the District. The following information is submitted in compliance with Sections 9400-9406 of the Elections Code of the State of California. Such information is based upon the best estimates and projections presently available from official sources, upon experience within the District, and other demonstrable factors.

The following information is provided pursuant to Elections Code Section 9401:

- 1. The best estimate of the average annual tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$49.00 per \$100,000 (4.9¢ per \$100) of assessed valuation. It is currently expected that the tax will be collected until fiscal year 2056-57.
- 2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, for each year that bonds are outstanding, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing this statement, is \$49.00 per \$100,000 (4.9¢ per \$100) of assessed valuation, which is projected to be the same in every fiscal year the bonds remain outstanding.
- 3. The best estimate of total debt service, including principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold will be approximately \$2.0 billion.

Voters should note that these estimates are based on projections derived from information obtained from official sources, and are based on the assessed value (not market value) of taxable property on the County's official tax rolls. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills and tax advisors to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

The attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon projections and estimates only, which amounts are not maximum amounts and durations and are not binding upon the District. The actual debt service, tax rates, and the years in which they will apply may vary depending on the timing of bond sales, the par amount of bonds sold at each sale, and actual increases in assessed valuations. The timing of the bond sales and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on the need for project funds and other considerations. Actual assessed valuations will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

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
